

Devotement | A Call To...Worship | John 12:1-11

- 1. Thinking back to the first Sunday of our New Year teaching series, have you spent any time remembering the death of Jesus?
- 2. Do you know any good definitions of 'worship'? You might want to have a go at crafting a definition as a small group it's not as easy as you might think it should be.
- 3. Does your definition from Q2 avoid the traps Chris shared concerning what worship is not? How is your definition less than perfect or complete?
- 4. How does your definition of worship compare to Paul's in Romans 12:1-2?
- 5. Have you ever been tempted to (or actually) left a church because of your worship experience? Where, do you think, is the line between corporate worship being genuinely unhelpful to you (because it's less than adequate in reality) vs a consumerist approach to corporate worship? Is one aspect of corporate worship more important than another? Why? Why not?
- 6. Reflect on the different individuals captured in John 12:1-11. Who do you most identify with, if at all?
- 7. Was Mary being wasteful and/or reckless? Discuss. What might your response be if Jesus prompted your heart to sacrifice your annual salary in such a way?
- 8. Mary has her critics in the story. Are there ways that your worship, or heart-response to Jesus, is inhibited by what others might think? How might you get to the point where you respond more to your heart than your critics?
- 9. Mary's act of worship seems to be a prophetic act, speaking of what was to come in Jesus' life. How is this so?
- 10. If *'the heart of worship begins from the heart'*, how metaphorically speaking are you ensuring that you are 'spending time at the feet of Jesus' to ensure that your heart is full of the things of God?
- 11. How is Esther Bouton's response to God's call an act of worship? Spend time praying for her. She flies/flew to Uganda at 7pm on Monday 10 January.
